

MEMBER PROFILE-

Roz Jennings:

What shapes a life? I guess childhood experiences, educational and career opportunities and the relationships you establish over a lifetime.

I had a very secure childhood with the good fortune to be born into a loving and happy family. My father was a primary school principal and my mother, like most women of her era, was a stay at home Mum. They were absolutely lovely people and were pillars of the community in the small country town on the Darling Downs near Toowoomba where I grew up. I am the 3rd of 4 children – two brothers and a sister and we are all close friends.

The four of us went to boarding school for the four years of our secondary education. My sister and I attended Fairholme College in Toowoomba, a Presbyterian girls college, which was determined (against all odds) to turn us all into young “ladies”. It was a very strict school, like most private schools in the early sixties, and we had virtually no freedom. We thrilled with the risk of sneaking a cigarette in the toilets which, of course, was an expellable offence and even coffee was banned so to sneak coffee into the dorms made us shiver with the sheer rebellion of it all. Fairholme placed a big emphasis on the arts which I loved. I did well academically at school and at the end of grade 12 received a teacher’s scholarship. So it was off to university and teachers college in Brisbane and teaching became my chosen career at least for the immediate future.

My first teaching posting was Ingham High School. The north Queensland culture was a huge shock to the system but it was there that I started to fall under the spell of the tropics - the warmth, the lushness and the big wet. The following year I transferred to Mackay North High School and so fate dealt me a good hand again because it was in Mackay that I met the love of my life. Peter was sailing on a barquentine sailing ship doing charter work out of Mackay. I was 20 and he was 26 when we met in a pub in Mackay and I guess you could say it was love at first sight.

In 1969, we decided to travel overseas. Peter sailed across the Pacific on *Ondine*, a 70 foot racing yacht, and I flew over and met him in San Francisco. This was the beginning of several exciting years working on charter boats in the Caribbean and the north east seaboard of the USA and travelling and living in Mexico, Canada, the US and Europe doing bar work, waitressing and house and pet sitting along the way.

We decided to get married so came home to Oz , got married in Watsons Bay in Sydney straightaway (after a 2 week “engagement”- yes - you can organize a wedding in 2 weeks) and headed north up the coast, all our belongings fitting into 2 backpacks, to find the tropical and sailing lifestyle we both loved so much. We had discovered the Whitsundays while living in Mackay and thought it one of the most beautiful places on earth so it was inevitable that we would end up in Airlie Beach. Airlie Beach was a very different place when we arrived in 1972 though. It was just on the verge of booming. I worked at Proserpine High school for the first 4 years living here and Pete worked on charter boats. He had a graphic design qualification from East Sydney Tech so he started to do the odd brochure and logo design , then designed a toad race t-shirt. We began selling them at the toad races and then we started selling more and more screen printed t-shirts and Airlie Design Studios was born. We started off printing the shirts on the kitchen table but soon needed to employ staff and moved to bigger premises. By this time I had given up teaching to work in the business full time. We ran the business together for over 22 years, finally selling in 2000 to begin our retirement.

Family has meant so much to us both. Our daughter Julia was born in 1978 and Melanie was born in 1980. It was quite difficult juggling a growing business and raising a family especially as there were no day care centres back then but we managed. Our daughters are delightful young women and have given us unlimited happiness (along with a few grey hairs). Melanie and her 2 children are living in Airlie Beach and we are besotted with our 2 gorgeous grandchildren. Julia is enjoying living in Melbourne, loves the city life, and is carrying on the family teaching tradition. Julia and Melanie tell me they had an idyllic childhood here in Airlie Beach. We bought our own 37 foot sailing boat when Melanie was 4 and Julia was 6 (by then good swimmers) and for the next 15 years spent our weekends sailing around the Whitsundays with the kids as crew.
