There have been plenty of "ups and downs" in that time but now the conference is here and I am sure it will be terrific.


It would not have been possible without a lot of hard work and my thanks go to all those members who have helped in some way with the organisation necessary.

ADVOCACY

OCTOBER IS A BUSY MONTH FOR INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION DAYS

October 15th is International Day of Rural Women; 17th is International Day for Eradication of Poverty and 24th is UN Day. As well as that, October is Sexual Violence Awareness month.

It is very fitting that we will be celebrating Rural Women with our General meeting this month at Christina's farm. We all live in Rural Queensland but some parts are more rural than others. I have just travelled the "loop" from here through Charters Towers, Hughenden, Winton, Longreach, Emerald and home. The rural people out there are doing it tough. There hasn't been rain to speak of since the floods of 2010-11. Our land is truly one of droughts and flooding rain. It is most often the women who keep these rural communities going and it was through this that the CWA was formed in Qld and NSW in 1922. It became a national entity (CWAA) in 1945. Our guest speaker for this month's meeting is a long standing member of the Proserpine CWA.

Wouldn't it be wonderful to eradicate poverty? However, this will never happen. Bob Hawke was very genuine when he uttered "that no child will live in poverty after 1990". Alas, there will always be the rich and there will always be the poor. Being a member of Zonta International gives us a chance to collectively help some of the world's poor and oppressed.

UNITED NATIONS:

The Beijing +20 conference has just ended in New York. It is 20 years since 30,000 activists and 17,000 registered delegates descended on Beijing to discuss gender equality and women's rights. It was the UN's 4th World Conference on women. Dr Carmen Lawrence was our delegate. She said at the time," We don't have long. We must accelerate our action for change." Hilary Clinton proclaimed," Women's rights are human rights." Other prominent women at the conference were: Benazir Bhutto; Madeline Albright and Aung San Suu Kyi who sent a message via video. The collective message was clear and the aim unequivocal: "Gender equality and Gender Empowerment". The outcome of the conference was "The Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action". It was signed by 189 nations including Australia and remains the most progressive blueprint ever for the advancement of women.

So - what happened? Why are we in some instances going backwards? Some statistics: Among 196 nations, only 10 have a female head of state and the number of women in parliament is minimal. (We just have to look at our recent past). Some 30 nations still have a law that places the man at the head of the household and 19 legally require the wife to "obey" the husband. 32 nations prohibit a woman getting a passport without the consent of a man and 100 nations have restrictions on what job a woman can do. Then there are those fundamentalists who decide how much of a woman's body can be seen and by whom. It is estimated that 200million women don't have access to contraception while one woman dies every 2 minutes in child birth.

In Australia, the issues are different but we are still a long way from gender equality. A good example is salary. We have actually fallen further behind men since 1995. Violence against women is getting worse as is murder of such victims.

So what is the problem? It is suggested that the answer may lie in the powerful backlash against women's equality being felt right around the world. And a diplomatic quagmire that has stymied any will to fight it. In Perth this month, Australia held its own Gender Equality Convention with such leaders as Dame Quentin Bryce and Dr. Carmen Lawrence. "Australian women have a long history that we should be proud of," Dame Quentin said. "We have had a significant and serious input into International discussions and global conferences which comes from a real generosity from the women of our country."

As there will not be any further scrutiny or re-jigging of the Beijing Platform for fear of rocking the boat so to speak (Ms Phumzile Miambo-Ngcuka-- head of UN Women), I find it reassuring that women like Dame Quentin, Rosie Batty and Natasha Stott Despoja are working on our behalf. Maybe Australia can lead the world in gender equality. (Summarised from an article by ABC reporter: Virginia Haussengger)

WOMEN WHO 'BECAME' MEN TO GET AHEAD—PART 2

Denis Smith, born Dorothy Lawrence

In 1914, Dorothy Lawrence was an ambitious cub reporter with aspirations of becoming a war correspondent. Living in Paris when war was declared, she contacted numerous British newspapers offering her services but was turned down by them all, on account of her being a woman. The following year, and aged just 20, she flattened her figure using a corset, cut off her hair and used a razor blade on her face in the hope of giving herself razor burn. She learned how to move like a man and joined the ranks of the Royal Engineers under the name Denis Smith. She served for 10 days on the Western Front before her real identity was discovered. Lawrence's thinking had been that by going 'undercover' as a Tommy she would secure the access the editors doubted she could get as a female journalist. In 1919, though heavily censored by the War Office, Lawrence published *Sapper Dorothy Lawrence: The Only English Woman Soldier*, an account of her experience in France.

James Barry, born Margaret Ann Bulkley

The story of Dr James Barry was only finally told in 2008. Barry was a pioneering surgeon for the British Army who died in 1865 after falling victim to dysentery. Shortly after his death, a maid tasked with preparing his body for burial claimed Barry was a woman. Army officials, appalled they could have been so badly fooled (and presumably particularly outraged they had been duped by a woman), locked away his medical records. In 2008, letters were found confirming Barry had in fact been born Margaret Ann Buckley, niece of James Barry, a professor of painting at the Royal Academy. Barry, living as a man, became the first biological woman to graduate with a

medical degree, went on to have the highest recovery rate of patients treated during the Crimean War, and reportedly became the first surgeon in the then British Empire to successfully perform a caesarean section.



Christian Davies, born Christian 'Kit' Cavanagh

Christian 'Kit' Cavanagh (born 1667 in Dublin) had no desire to join the Army as a youngster, but disguised herself as a man to do so after her husband disappeared, apparently to Holland with the British Army. After 13 years of searching, and having fought in battles, been wounded, captured, discharged and then having re-enlisted, she finally found Richard. Sadly, he was in a new relationship with another woman. Davies' secret was revealed after she suffered a fractured skull in combat, and she was discharged once again. She died in 1739 and was buried with full military honours. Her story was recently told in the BBC4 documentary Harlots, Housewives and Heroines: A 17th Century History for Girls.
