Mayhem in the world economy and geopolitical uncertainty is affecting our Zonta Club in the Whitsundays.

MEANWHILE IN REMOTE ANTARCTICA



Recent chaos in the world economy brought about by US tariffs, Australis's exposure to the Chinese economy and ongoing conflict in the Middle East, Ukraine and other parts of the world has now had a direct impact on our club here in the Whitsundays.

When I first became Treasure the USD: AUD exchange rate was \$1 United States Dollar =\$1.40 Australian Dollar. Now the exchange rate is \$1 USD =\$1.60. In the two weeks since the Board set our 2025-26 membership fees-the AUD has dropped 10% against the USD.

Why does this matter?

Even though Zonta International has maintained each member mandatory annual contributions to Zonta International at USD \$88-each member now needs to pay AUD \$139.36 to cover this payment. Add in district dues and the amount left over from our membership fees is quite diminished.

In addition-our 30% annual contribution from our fundraising budget to the Zonta Foundation for Women will decrease because of the extremely low exchange rate. An AUD \$10,000 contribution to the Zonta Foundation will only be USD \$6,000 in today's terms.

So, pain all around. Things are unlikely to improve in the short term – so it is even more important that we double down in helping our local community where we can have the most impact.

Norfolk Island - Betty Whitehorn

I have attached photo of Tony and me in Norfolk Island at the Queen Elizabeth look out overlooking the sweeping vistas of Kingston.

What a fascinating and beautiful island. It's history engaging. It is recorded that Captain Cook discovered the island in October 1774 on his second voyage to the South Pacific. More recently archaeological remains suggest that Polynesians occupied the island from 1150-1450.

Norfolk Island served as a penal colony twice. Convicts (men and women) were sent from New South Wales



from March 1788- February 1814 and again from 1825 – to 1853. Convicts were housed in Kingston and building remains are still there today.

In 1856 Pitcairn Islanders, descendants of the Bounty Mutineers came to Norfolk island to settle. Some stayed and some got homesick and went home to Pitcairn. Family contact was maintained by letter writing. Queen Victoria granted Norfolk Island to the relocating Pitcairn Islanders. To this day there is some disagreement about this arrangement.

The Australian Government in 2016 assumed responsibility for services replacing the previous selfgoverning model. The Norfolk Islanders are openly lobbying to have this reversed. Tourism is a thriving industry on the island, and it was a holiday over far too soon. J



Japan March 2025 - Janice

Barry and I spent a month in Japan in March. We arranged this through a travel agent in Brisbane that specialises in tailored itineraries for countries in Asia. So, we had all our bookings made and a day-by-day outline of where and what. Some guided days and a lot by us with suggestions on what to do.

We chose to spend a few days in the major cities and most of the time in less visited areas. So having arrived in Tokyo, from Cairns, we travelled north to Sapporo on the northern island of Hokkaido – by train, visiting, amongst other places the Onsen town of Noboribetsu. Wonderful hot spring bath in our room or could share the communal (women and men separate).

Sapporo was very cold and snowing a lot of the time – lots of layers of clothing. Beautiful part of the world.

We flew south to Fukuoka on Kyushu – moderate sized city and easy to get around. Wonderful train service throughout most of Japan but can get lost in the subways. From here was made our way south to Kagoshima – lots of history here. Then on by ferry to the island of Yakushima. A large part of this small mountainous island is UNESCO listed forest of mostly Japanese cedar. Some of the trees of more than 700 years old and individually named. Lots of walking in rainy and cold conditions but it fitted in with the forest.

Back to Kyushu, where we drove through forested national parks areas, small towns and farmlands and stayed at a couple of lovely traditional Japanese hotels, complete with hot spring baths, tatami mats and futon beds. Beautiful shrines, temples, and gardens.



An overnight ferry (read ship) took us to Osaka and the highlights of the street food and Sumo wrestling -



such a fun day. Local train to Kyoto next and an evening in the Gion district (geishas still exist if you have the money and contacts). We did see a couple of the girls, but no photos allowed. We had a fabulous trip. Outside of the major cities there is not much English, but Google translator helped. Travel is relatively easy by train, and we drove without getting lost too many times. The food in Japan is everywhere, anytime. All good and lots of sweets as well. Japanese breakfast in traditional hotels is a bit of the challenge but that's part of the experience.

The Japanese people are very polite and overall, I think quite conservative. Just bow and smile. It is a very safe country to travel in and there is so much to see. Outside of the major cities we were often the only white faces.


